The entire staff of Jewish Family & Children's Services pulled together to provide high quality services to thousands of our community's most vulnerable citizens. Despite the continuing effects of the pandemic on our world, we remained steadfast in our goal of strengthening the community by providing behavioral health, healthcare and social services to all ages, faiths and backgrounds. This dedication to our mission permeated all parts of our organization, from our clinic and administrative teams to our dedicated board members, volunteers and donors.

Here are just a few highlights from the past year:

- · All of our clinics have hours for primary care services
- We recently expanded our older adult class offerings to individuals and groups outside of Maricopa County for the first time
- The fifth cohort graduated from our Professional Leadership Group. The sixth cohort is underway now.
- JFCS was named as one of the nonprofit organizations of the year by AZ Big Media/Ranking Arizona
- Sojourner Center celebrated its 45th anniversary in September and received Trauma Certification from the Arizona Trauma Institute.
- We held our first face-to-face Brighter Tomorrow Luncheon since before the pandemic
- JFCS received national re-accreditation from the Council on Accreditation (COA), an international nonprofit organization that accredits human and social service providers in best practices for child welfare, behavioral health and communitybased human and social service providers.

These past several years have been challenging, and social services programs like JFCS have seen an exponential increase in requests for services. Patient levels have been growing at our integrated health clinics. We have continued to support hundreds of the Valley's most vulnerable through our Family, Youth & Children Services. Our Shelter Without Walls program, along with Sojourner Center, have provided safety and services to those facing or exposed to domestic abuse. We have engaged thousands of seniors with classes both online and in person. And we have served our Jewish community with counseling, career services, community education, financial assistance and more.

Thanks to all of you who make it possible for us to provide critical care to our clients across all of our program areas and help us heal lives whatever it takes. Because of you, more than 40,000 individuals throughout Maricopa County received critical services.

JFCS Partners with Glendale Union High School District to Provide School-Based Counseling Services

In the fall JFCS announced a partnership with Glendale Union High School District to provide school-based counseling services to students in need, a first-of-its-kind program. The collaboration aims to streamline access to behavioral health services for students identified by teachers or school social workers as needing support.

As part of this partnership, JFCS has established a school-based clinician position at Independence High School, where the school social worker can directly refer students in need of behavioral health services. The referrals are then sent to JFCS's Central Scheduling and Referral Center (CSRC), and the intake is then scheduled with the school-based clinician who can complete the intake at the school itself. This approach ensures that students can receive timely and convenient access to counseling services during the school day.

"By embedding a clinician at Independence High School, we can streamline the process for students to access counseling services, making it easier for them to get the support they need," said Rochelle Ryan, LPC, Clinical Site Director of Behavioral & Integrated Health at JFCS. "We're happy to partner with Glendale Union High School District to test this innovative care model and we hope to expand this type of operation if the results continue to be positive."

The partnership between JFCS and Glendale Union High School District represents a proactive approach toward addressing the mental health needs of students in the community. By providing accessible and convenient counseling services within the school setting, the collaboration aims to support the well-being and academic success of students.

Glendale Union High School District serves approximately 16,000 students in grades 9-12 in the Phoenix metropolitan area. Independence High School is located at 6602 N 75th Ave. and is just a few miles from JFCS's West Valley Clinics where they are able to receive integrated health care to include therapy and a primary health care provider if needed.

JFCS Expands Use of Positive Parenting Program

Jewish Family and Children's Service (JFCS) expanded its use of the Positive Parenting Program (Triple P) in its Child & Family Solutions program division. This program, which has been part of JFCS' Behavioral Health program for several years, is a highly effective tool that gives parents practical strategies to help them build healthy relationships and confidently manage their children's behavior.

As part of the expansion, JFCS' Homebased Services was awarded a contract with the Department of Child Safety to provide Triple P services to assist adoptive and permanent guardianship families. The Shelter Without Walls domestic violence program was also awarded training scholarships for staff to use Triple P with domestic violence survivors and help mitigate the impact of violence on their children.

The Triple P program is internationally recognized as one of the most effective evidence-based parenting programs in the world. With over 35 years of ongoing research, it has been shown to work across cultures, socioeconomic groups, and in many different kinds of family structures. Triple P has helped approximately 4 million children and their families. It is used in 31 countries and has been translated into 23 languages. More than 91,000 practitioners have been trained it its delivery.

JFCS' decision to expand its use of Triple P is part of its continuous efforts to help the community overcome trauma, avoid abuse, and promote safety and security in developing youth. By providing parents with the tools they need to build healthy relationships with their children, JFCS hopes to make a positive impact on families throughout the community.

"JFCS is committed to providing the best possible services to our community," said Linda Scott, Vice President of Child & Family Solutions for JFCS. "By expanding our use of the Triple P program, we are giving parents the tools they need to build healthy, happy families. We are excited about the potential impact this program will have on our community and look forward to seeing the positive outcomes it will bring."

JFCS' expansion of the Triple P program is a significant step toward promoting positive parenting and building stronger, healthier families. With the support of evidence-based programs like Triple P, parents can feel confident in their ability to navigate the challenges of parenthood and provide their children with the best possible start in life.

Valley Woman Finds Support, Safety at Shelter Without Walls

Looking at her, Cheryl Baker would not strike you as a person who needed protection from anyone. Her tattooed body, piercing eyes, and tough girl persona belay a soft inner core proving that anyone, regardless of appearance, can find themselves in dire circumstances.

Five years ago, Baker split with her husband after seven years together. She was living on her own, but she came to realize just how dependent she was on him financially, emotionally, and mentally. She also could not see at first how abusive the relationship had been. Like many people, she continually re-opened the door to her ex in an attempt to save the marriage. Then one night she came face-to-face with just how abusive her ex-husband could be.

"In June of 2018 he ended up pulling a gun on me and while he attempted to load it I was able to get away because he put the magazine in backwards and the bullets fell to the carpet," says Baker. "I was able to run and when I looked back he was pointing it at me."

Baker's ex-husband was arrested later that night, but after the weekend passed, he was released. Two weeks later they had a court date, but he did not show up. The state ended up dropping the charges.

"I didn't know how to process any of it so I actually left court, went to a bar, and got drunk," she said. "I actually wanted to go to our house and just tell him to finish it. I was that depressed and that distraught like I felt like he did kill me...like there was a portion of me that did die that night. I didn't know what to do and I really didn't even care."

Nevertheless, she realized she needed help. She did research online and found JFCS's Shelter Without Walls program. Through Shelter Without Walls she received therapy and learned how to recognize her issues and change the direction of her life. She says she still struggles, but she does the work it takes to keep going.

Where I am today no matter what I feel more empowered, and I found I can inspire other women," she says. "I actually have been asked to help mentor and I'm going to do that."

Shelter Without Walls is a domestic violence program that addresses the unmet needs in Maricopa County of survivors of domestic violence and their children. It is for survivors who can reside outside of a shelter setting, even as they are struggling to attain and/or maintain safety and independence, whether or not they are still living with their abuser. These are survivors who are identified as "falling through the cracks," those not yet separated from the abusive partner but wanting to live independently and needing assistance to do so safely. The program also assists survivors transitioning out of local shelters after a 30 to 120-day stay, as well as survivors living independently from their abusive partners but who are disconnected from services and struggling to remain independent.

The program includes safety-planning, resources like housing services and employment assistance, lay legal advocacy, case management, education, and support. Chaplaincy Program Fulfills Spiritual Needs for Those in Local Hospitals

During a hospital stay, it is common to experience stress, and receiving assistance for emotional and spiritual needs can bring great comfort. The chaplains from Jewish Family & Children's Service provide patients and their families with that spiritual support and comfort.

JFCS chaplains visit 25 hospitals throughout the Valley and even provide emergency after-hour services for end-of-life issues. In 2022, JFCS chaplains served 4,279 people.

"Chaplains offer much more than support and prayer," says Ellie Schwartzberg, JFCS Vice President of Older Adults and Jewish Community Services. "Services run the gamut from crisis intervention, end of life issues, grief and bereavement guidance, to pre-surgical and post-surgical spiritual care. It's known that those suffering from an illness have greater chances of recovery if they have a form of support."

JFCS hospital chaplain Rabbi Robert Kravitz can attest to the power of emotional and spiritual support. Below he shares the story of an elderly female patient he has visited multiple times in the same hospital:

"She was from New York City and her husband was a patient at times too. When her daughter was engaged, she asked me to call her daughter to arrange a meeting about the wedding. Plans were being made for a ceremony in 14 months. After her father again became ill, with very little hope for recovery, the daughter asked me again for advice. She wanted her Dad to attend her wedding and to have her Mom bring her down the aisle with him. Her Mom got stronger and finally left the hospital. Her Dad was homebound

and frail. Within two weeks their family and I arranged for the ceremony -- months early -- so her Dad could see his only daughter get married under the Chupah. The joy in the faces of the attendees – family from everywhere, college friends, even the staff of the venue – brought a huge smile to her Dad's face as he sat in his wheelchair. I was pleased to facilitate their Simchah and sign their Ketubah. Just another event in the activity of a hospital chaplain."

JFCS Rabbi Michael Dubitsky also suggests spiritual support can be as simple as just being there for someone:

"I was making my rounds in one of the hospitals in my region one week and came into a room of a woman in her mid-80s who was awaiting test results. She was understandably anxious. Her spouse was in the room and reading a newspaper. When the patient saw me enter, she said "I am so glad to see you." When I inquired why she told me that in a previous hospital stay in another state she was in the hospital for three weeks and no one visited her, and that here she was in the hospital for less than a week and was hoping that a chaplain would visit her. We proceeded to say the mi shebeirach prayer for a refuah shleima —a complete recovery, and spent the visit talking about her family and connection to the Jewish community. When I arose to leave, the patient (who by now had become less anxious) again expressed her thanks to me and JFCS and requested that if she ended up in the hospital for her procedure that I come back to say another prayer."



Snapshot of Our Fiscal Year 2022




