JFCS is celebrating the opening of a new integrated medical and behavioral health center in the underserved Maryvale neighborhood of Phoenix. Over its 17 years of operation, the former clinic in Maryvale had reached a crisis due to overcrowding and inadequate space. The new Michael R. Zent Healthcare Center, named in honor of the highly regarded JFCS CEO who passed away earlier this year, will be able to serve a growing number of children and families with complex physical, mental health and substance abuse issues. Seventy percent of these patients also have at least one ongoing medical condition.

"We are pleased to see the vision that we've been working on for several years come to life," said Mary Jo Whitfield, Interim Deputy CEO of Behavioral Health at JFCS. "Now we have the ability to meet the total healthcare needs for all

The new Michael R. Zent Healthcare Center expands services to an additional 2,000 clients per year, increasing the number of patients served from 6,500 to 8,500 annually. At least 4,000 of these clients are children. The new center was designed specifically to provide both medical and behavioral health services in an

Patient Spotlight: Meet Vanessa

Vanessa* is a 10-year-old girl who has been in the Arizona foster care system since she was 6 and removed from her home in Maryvale when both her parents were incarcerated. Vanessa was referred to JFCS by the Arizona Department of Child Safety and has been a patient at the Maryvale clinic for the past two years for depression and other trauma-related symptoms. She is also at high-risk for developing diabetes.

To address Vanessa's whole health needs, she is now seeing a primary care physician at the clinic in addition to her therapists. Her care coordinator recently approached her with the idea of enrolling in Girls on the Run, an innovative health program offered at the Michael

R. Zent Healthcare Center that serves girls ages 8 to 12 with behavioral health concerns plus a need for improved physical health. She agreed and is now training with a team for a 5k race, learning about proper nutrition and developing good physical exercise habits. But perhaps most importantly, she's developing a support system with the other girls participating in the program.

environment where clinical and support staff work together, sharing treatment information electronically to determine the best course of action for each person's health.



"True to the man himself, the center is cutting-edge and it services a community in need," said Dr. Mario Lippy, co-director of the clinic. "Dr. Zent was very involved with the Latino community – he spoke Spanish and grew up in Tempe – and many of

our patients are Hispanic. He wanted to provide whole healthcare to a population that has complex behavioral health and medical issues in order to improve their lives."

Services at the Michael R. Zent Healthcare Center emphasize prevention and early intervention to stop the development of chronic illness and acute conditions that can lead to unnecessary hospitalization and emergency room care.

Additionally, a staff clinician is co-located in the Arizona Department of Child Safety office that serves Maryvale, which has the state's highest rate of children removed from the home due to serious abuse and neglect. As a result, the Michael R. Zent Healthcare Center serves a large number of Maryvale children in foster care who have severe trauma symptoms.

Approximately two-thirds of the foster-care youth referred to the Maricopa County behavioral health system are assessed and treated at JFCS, many of them at the Maryvale clinic. There are currently nearly 19,000 children in Arizona's foster-care system.

make them whole again," Dr. Lippy said. "We get to do some of the most rewarding work, but it's not for everyone. It's a high-volume, high-stress environment, but when you're making a difference in the lives of children, it's worth it."

JFCS' goal is to use this clinic as a model and replicate the integrated care approach at its three other healthcare clinics in Maricopa County. "This clinic represents an opportunity to address social determinants that hinder access to quality healthcare, ranging from socioeconomic

status to language barriers or lack of transportation, among other factors," Whitfield said. "Through health literacy and our outreach efforts, we believe that patients in our clinic will achieve an improved quality of life over time."

Michael R. Zent Healthcare Center Highlights



INTEGRATED MEDICAL AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTHCARE SERVICES

Patients have one electronic health record (EHR) that documents both medical and behavioral health services, medications and treatment.



INCREASED CAPACITY

The clinic will treat up to 8,500 patients annually.



IMPROVED CARE COORDINATION

Children and youth in the foster-care system are provided Care Coordinators to ensure they receive the behavioral health, medical and dental services to which they are entitled.



ENHANCED TREATMENT FOR CHILDHOOD TRAUMA AND AUTISM

Specialized care for children identified with severe trauma symptoms and those impacted by autism spectrum disorder.



PARENT OBSERVATION AND TRAINING ROOMS

Parents and caretakers can observe and learn behavioral techniques they can use at home with their children.



INNOVATIVE TECHNOLOGY

JFCS utilizes the NextGen® EHR platform to coordinate care. The medical equipment syncs directly with a patient's EHR to upload data like blood pressure readings directly.
